The Rector writes.....

This month we start the season of **Lent**. The word itself comes from an old English word meaning 'the lengthening of days' or Spring. In earliest times it was observed by those who were preparing for the baptism at Easter. Later, the 40 days of Lent

were identified with the 40 days Jesus spent in the wilderness. Each year it provides us with an opportunity to re-examine our lives and through prayer, study and self-denial, to renew our love for God. This might sound a little daunting and forbidding. Self-denial and discipline do not come easy to any of us, particularly as the last two years of the Covid pandemic has denied us so much. But remember again the origin of the word Lent. It is



associated with longer days and more light, increased warmth and the resultant growth. It is something very positive and creative. It is about re-energising what has always been there but has lain dormant.

Yes, the last two years have been ones of struggle and disruption, but as the parish returns to a pre-pandemic normality, we look forward to a period of spiritual challenge, refreshment and renewal. While the wearing of face masks, social distancing, hand sanitising and other health measures are no longer required, please feel free to continue to apply these standards when coming to church or parish events if it makes you feel more comfortable. It is important that we continue to look out for each other and adapt our behaviour in whatever way we think best, while also recognising the reopening of so much which was restricted for so long. Service on St Patrick's Day

16ú Márta: Celebrating St Patrick – Ag Ceiliúradh Naomh Pádraig

Tháinig Naomh Pádraig ón Bhreatain Bheag chun an Chríostaíocht a chur ar bun in Eirinn sa 5ú aois, agus rinne sé mór oibre chun creideamh a mhúscailt i muintir na hÉireann. Is féidir a mheon a fheiscint sna rudaí a scríobh sé, go mór-mhór ins an iomann, St Patrick's Breastplate (translated into English by Mrs Cecil Frances Alexander, with a tune by Charles Villiers Stanford). IRISH RED CROSS and the Crisis in Ukraine



The Irish Red Cross is actively supporting the people of Ukraine. Many of you may have seen their appeals for money, so that proper supplies can be bought, and support put in place in the countries which are receiving thousands of refugees. You may have donated online already. The escalation in fighting will bring further upheaval, loss, and fear to people's daily lives, including threatening to bring a halt to key essential services.

As a parish we are responding by having retiring collections in all our churches for the next two weeks. If you would like to support the Red Cross as they support all those uprooted and traumatised by the Russian invasion of Ukraine, please leave your donation in the basket provided. Thank you.

As a parish we have also been asked to advertise the information below in support of the Polish community in Cork.

Humanitarian Appeal for Ukraine

As we observe the war in Ukraine, from a distance, it would be good to do something positive to support the people of Ukraine in their hour of need. There are a number of ways we can do this. We can donate money through the Irish Red Cross, Goal.ie, Concern.ie or UNICEF. The Polish community in Cork have got together and have arranged a courier to take a lorry load to Poland where they will be sorted. Items for volunteer men who are in Ukraine to fight will be couriered there. The remainder will be used to support the women and children who are now refugees in Poland. The list of items needed are: Blankets, sleeping bags, towels, a toilet bag with:(toothbrush, toothpaste, soap & bodywash), bandages, disposable gloves, First Aid packs, winter socks, fleeces & gloves (these are mainly for men) Baby food, nappies wet wipes, Sudocreme, babygrows, kids clothes for winter, jumpers, new underwear. Soap, toothbrushes, hand cream, shampoo and sponges, towels. Tea, coffee, dried food goods, tinned food. The closing date for this dispatch is 12th March. Take whatever you can donate to:

- 'Seeds for Sunday' On Wednesday evenings in Lent on Zoom we will be looking at one of the readings for the following Sunday. We start at 8pm on 9th March and each session will be about 40 minutes.
- Wednesday Eucharist celebrated at 11.00am each week in St Luke's Church. A time for prayer and reflection in the middle of the week.
- Reading Mark's Gospel Come and hear 16 parishioners read Mark's Gospel in one sitting. Sunday 3 April between 9.30 – 11.00 in St Luke's Church. Refreshments served before the service begins.
- Walking on Fridays Every Friday afternoon at 2.30 there will be an opportunity to walk for up to an hour, followed by coffee. People can do all or part of the walk, or just join us for refreshments afterwards. The aim is some gentle exercise, fresh air, conversation.
 - Friday 4th Blackrock Village (meet at the Bakery) and the Marina.
 - Friday 11th Passage West (meet at St Mary's Church) to Rochestown.
 - Friday 18th Holiday (choose your own route).
 - Friday 25th Community Park in Douglas and Ballybrack Woods.
 - Friday 1^{st} Tramore Valley Park (meet in main cark park).
 - Friday 8th Blackrock Castle (meet at car park nearest the Castle) towards Harty's Quay.
- Holy Week- We welcome back Canon Eithne Lynch as our guest preacher on Maundy Thursday and Good Friday.
