#### The Rector writes.....

For me **Maundy Thursday** (14<sup>th</sup> April this year) is one of the most moving days in the church calendar. While I love the excitement and anticipation of both Christmas

and Easter mornings, Maundy Thursday is different. On this special night, we remember the Last Supper when Jesus shared bread and wine with his disciples one last time, before his arrest, trial, and crucifixion. It is full of drama when all the human senses need to be deployed in worship. We have the touch of the water used to wash the disciples' feet, the taste of the Eucharist, the sound of the gospel narrative and hymns



reminding us of Jesus' mandate to 'love one another', the stripping of the altar at the end of the service, as eyesight is strained when the lights are dimmed, and finally the departure from church in silence. It demands a lot from both the clergy and congregation, but it is also contemplative and reflective. I hope to see many of you at St Luke's Church for the service this year.

In this newsletter, you will be able to read the full text of a Pastoral Letter from the Archbishops of Armagh and Dublin regarding the return of the use of the Common Cup or Chalice at services of Holy Communion. Please read it in detail. For two years now because of the Covid pandemic, the practice of the Church of Ireland has been at variance with what was re-established at the time of the Reformation, when Holy Communion was administered in both kinds (bread and wine), to both the clergy and people. Indeed, this was the norm in the Early Church following on from the tradition of the Last Supper. From Maundy Thursday in this parish, we will return to this ancient practice. The congregation is asked to come forward to the communion rails as before, remove their mask if they are wearing one, and receive the consecrated bread in their hands. They will also be given the chalice. Please take it and receive as you feel comfortable. However, if you still prefer to receive in one kind only for the time being, please still take the chalice and return it to the priest. Do not feel awkward. I request that you come forward to the rails and receive communion, rather than remain in your pew.

In some denominations, the wine is distributed in separate glasses or cups. In the Anglican Communion, of which we are a part, we have always resisted this for a variety of reasons. The gospels suggest Jesus took one cup and gave it to all his disciples to drink. There is a powerful challenge in this. We are reminded of the agonising decision that faced Jesus when he was praying before the crucifixion: 'My Father, if it is possible, let this cup pass from me; yet not what I want but what you want.' (Matthew 26:39). We are also reminded by the one cup that we cannot drink it alone. We drink from a common cup as a strong symbol of unity and our willingness to accept each other. We share our love and lives as we share the cup. The implications of this for fellowship and support in the local church, for relationships between rich and poor in communities and nations, and for justice between first world and developing countries are enormous. The cup of love and unity is unavoidably also a cup of sacrifice.

As we take this one last and very important step back to normality in our churches, I wish you all a good Holy Week and a very happy Easter.

**Lent, Holy Week and Easter** We are in the season of Lent. The word itself comes from an old English word meaning 'the lengthening of days' or Spring. It is about re-energising what has always been there, even if it has lain dormant.



As a parish we have a programme of activities to encourage spiritual growth. The last session of our **'Seeds for Sunday'** series being run on Zoom is on Wednesday 6 April. Please contact the Rector if you want to be sent the link.

On Sunday 3 April, 16 parishioners will be involved in reading **Mark's Gospel** in one sitting between 9.30 and 11.00 in St Luke's Church. It is hoped that others may come and take the opportunity to hear this Gospel in totality. It is the shortest of the four and refreshments will be served before the service starts at 11.15.

Every Friday afternoon a group of parishioners meet in a different part of the parish to accompany the rector on an hour long **walk** and end up at a coffee shop for conversation. We are meeting at 2.30 in the main carpark in Tramore Valley Park on 1 April and in the carpark beside Blackrock Castle for the final walk on 8 April. Such activities are important for both **mental and spiritual health**.



Finally for **Holy Week**, we will welcome back a former curate as our guest preacher — **Canon Eithne Lynch**. She will be preaching at our evening services in St Luke's Church on Maundy Thursday and Good Friday. Many in this parish remember her ministry with affection and thanksgiving. She was initially to come to us in 2020, but now, as we move towards a pre pandemic normality, we pick up where we left off.

Eithne writes..."Holy Thursday draws us to the table, in the company of Jesus and the disciples as he begins to speak his final words on this side of his dying. The disciples will not understand everything Jesus has to say, will not be able to comprehend fully the importance of what he is telling them, but nevertheless his words will burn themselves into their hearts. These are the words that will return to the disciples later, in that bewildering time known as 'after'. These are the words that will comfort them and also stir their courage for the path that waits for them still.

But for now, they, and we, are at the table. As the night unfolds, we will see that the word at the centre of Jesus' vocabulary is this: Love."

On the Monday, Tuesday and Wednesday in Holy Week, short services of Compline with a meditation by the parish clergy will be held in St Luke's Church at 7.30pm.

On Easter morning we look forward to celebrating the joy of the resurrection. All our services are in included in this edition of the 'Parish Matters' newsletter.

The Archbishop of Armagh, the Most Revd John McDowell, and the Archbishop of Dublin, the Most Revd Dr Michael Jackson, issued the following pastoral letter to the members of the Church of Ireland on St Patrick's Day (17th March 2022):

Receiving the consecrated wine in the Holy Communion by means of the Common Cup (Chalice) is the norm in the teaching and tradition of the Church of Ireland and in the Anglican Communion in general. However, in light of public health advice issued at various times during the Covid—19 Pandemic, the House of Bishops circulated guidance, first on the spiritual efficacy of receiving Holy Communion in One Kind, and subsequently giving permission for the use of individual cups in strictly regulated circumstances.

Mindful of the unambiguous injunction contained in Article 30 of the Thirty–Nine Articles of Religion, we took these decisions reluctantly and with the stated intention of a return to the Anglican norm as soon as it was considered safe to do so, following independent advice, as has been our practice throughout the pandemic.

With the general phasing out of restrictions in most social settings, the House of Bishops has sought independent expert scientific advice on the return to the use of the Common Cup in Holy Communion. The advice we have received is that such a return would be reasonable now, especially in a vaccinated population and where anyone displaying symptoms of Covid–19 is encouraged to stay away from church services.

We have also been advised that wiping the rim of the chalice between each communicant (preferably with a linen cloth) will reduce the bacterial burden by up to 90%. Needless to say, great care should be taken in the cleansing of linens (purificators, corporals) and vessels (flagons, cruets, chalice, ciborium, lavabo etc.) before and after Holy Communion.

The Bishops received this scientific advice prior to the recent meeting of the House of Bishops and, with great joy, returned to the use of the Common Cup at our celebration of the Eucharist on that occasion.

We realise that a general return to the Common Cup in Holy Communion will take time to achieve. Many of us were taken by surprise at how rapidly most social restrictions were relaxed or completely removed, and have continued to practice our own forms of mitigation and self–restraint, so there will be those who will be cautious about receiving communion from a chalice.

There will be local factors which will need to be taken into account, as there have been for other forms of Covid mitigations. At present there is no cut—off point at which either Communion on One Kind or using individual cups should be replaced by the use of the Common Cup. However, we would urge parishes to give some thought as to how the return to our norm, without undue delay, will be achieved in in a manner that creates sufficient confidence to allow that moment to be genuinely joyful. In the meantime, no new permissions will be given for the use of individual cups.

Finally, we would emphasise that while no individual communicant should feel under immediate pressure to drink from a common vessel, the expert advice is clear in its implication that there is now no pressing reason to withhold the shared cup from faithful people who earnestly desire to partake of it.
